An in-depth review and disaggregation of data by the campus site-based committee led to the development of the goal, objectives, and strategies included in this Plan of Action.

Findings:

- Though most students are achieving passing scores on TAAS or TAKS, a few are not. These students are receiving a certificate of completion rather than a high school diploma.
- Though the number of Wings graduates decreased last year, it had been increasing for the previous four years. The decrease last year was because of a new emphasis at the high school to provide additional options for at risk students.
- The attendance rate continues to be an item to target.
- The Wings Program is very effective in helping to keep the district drop-out rate low.

Goal: Wings students will meet or exceed minimum state accountability requirements for assessment, attendance and course completion.

Objective 1: 90% of all senior students enrolled will complete course requirements for a high school diploma and will meet or exceed minimum requirements on state assessments. 90% of the remaining students will complete courses attempted and will meet or exceed minimum requirements on state assessments.

Pregnancy Related Services Description

Chapel Hill ISD provides pregnancy related services (PRS), which are support services for pregnant students to help them adjust and stay in school during the pregnancy and postpartum period. Additional support services provided by the district include compensatory education home instruction (CEHI), counseling services, health services, and service coordination for government agencies and community service organizations.

A required support service for districts that offer a PRS program, CEHI provides academic services to the student at home or hospital bedside. During periods of confinement, students will receive eye-to-eye contact with a certified teacher from the district for a minimum of four hours a week. Students served four or more hours will earn five days present for ADA. A student receiving CEHI may also receive limited services at the alternative school campus to help with the transition from home back to school. The district has designated Bobby Brasher and Kevin McCormick for compensatory education home instruction (CEHI).

Counseling services are provided two times a month or as needed for the pregnant students. Health services are provided by the school nurse.

The students are guided to appropriate outside agencies depending on individual needs.
